ARCHÆOLOGY IN SUFFOLK, 1962

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As in previous years, the report on archaeological finds during 1962 owes much both to individual observers and to those who have supplemented their own observation by collecting information in the areas in which they live or work. Their names are given in the 1961 report, and their contributions are again gratefully acknowledged.

At the time of writing, no information is forthcoming for the area covered by the Felixstowe Archaeological Movement, and no doubt many finds in other areas have not been reported, but as those living in the countryside become aware of the desirability of maintaining this survey in order to build up a picture of the past, so the completeness of the record may be expected to increase.

Perhaps special mention may be made of the recent work of Mr. P. G. M. Dickinson in examining and recording Suffolk monastic sites, and of the increased results of Mr. R. H. Farrands' aerial surveys. Work by the Ancient Monuments Department of the Ministry of Public Building & Works continues at Bury Abbey.

- 62. Ixworth (TL/931703). Bases of the north arcade of the nave of the Priory church have been uncovered, indicating the bays were very wide. Three of the four crossing bases are exposed but they are too slight to have supported a central tower. Fragments of the north aisle wall have been discovered in a party ditch. Two 12th century windows of the Canon's dormitory have been found behind the 19th century panelling in the house. (P. G. M. Dickinson).
- Kentford (TL/715666). Polished flint axe 11½ inches long with the long edges ground flat, actually found in 1961 on ploughing up pasture at the Medler Stud. (A. R. Edwardson).
- 64. Kersey (TL/999444). A tentative excavation disclosed the east wall of the Priory church, showing the building to have been 156 feet long. The foundations of three of the pillars of the central tower have been located. There was apparently a south aisle to the nave of six bays, but none on the north as the cloisters were on (P. G. M. The Priory has now been planned and the area presumably covered by the choir and transepts is open but no foundations have been discovered, implying that though planned, they were never built. The plan clearly indicates that the western 'tower' is in the nature of a narthex and unique, though its purpose is not so apparent. (P. G. M. Dickinson).

Operations were largely financed by the Suffolk Institute of Archaeology, with help from the Excursion Group of the Southwold Archaeological & Natural History Society. A hut was loaned by the Ancient Monuments Department of the Ministry of Works. Finds include sherds, painted wall plaster, fragments of windowglass and roofing tiles, knife with antler handle, As of Severus Alexander (M. & S. 543), key and fragment of shale bracelet.
