

NOTES FROM CORRESPONDING MEMBERS.

The Rev. R. B. Caton reports that a Great Skua (*Megalestris catarrhactis*) has been picked up near Ixworth, and that a Roller (*Coracias garrulus*) was killed near Thetford.

Contrary to the usual rule, Redwings have been far more plentiful than Fieldfares during the winter months.

The Rev. F. J. Eld draws attention to the reticulated stones in Stutton Church, belonging probably to the 10th or 11th century, and also to the coats of arms on the capitals of the pillars in the Nave Arcade in Stoke-by-Nayland Church.

Sede Vacante Wills. All who are interested in Suffolk pre-Reformation history should not fail to consult a "Calendar of Wills," compiled by the Rev. C. Eveleigh Woodruff, Hon. Librarian to the Dean and Chapter of Canterbury, and published as Volume III. of the publications of the Kent Archæological Society, Records Branch, 1914. The *Sede Vacante Wills* were "wills proved before the Commissary of the Prior and Chapter of Christ Church, Canterbury, during vacancies in the Primacy."

More than sixty Suffolk wills are mentioned in the Calendar; these wills are principally for the years 1500-1503.
